TEACHING PASSAGE: Revelation 10-11

Discussion Questions:

- Before the seventh trumpet is blown in chapter 10, we have another delay, and a mighty angel comes down from heaven. How is the angel described (verse 1)? Where else have we seen these descriptions before? (Revelation 4:3; 1:7,16, Exodus 13:21-22)
- 2. What did this angel have in his hand (verse 2) and what is the meaning of his stance? (Genesis 1:6-10)
- 3. What oath does the angel deliver? (verses 5-7) Then what is John instructed to do with the scroll? (verses 8-11)
- 4. As chapter 11 begins what is John given and what is he to do with it? (verses 1-2)
- 5. Chapter 11 we are also introduced to two witnesses how are they described and what are they given authority to do? (verses 3-6) Read Zechariah 4:2-6;14.
- 6. After these two witnesses "finished their testimony" what will happen? (verses 7-13)
- 7. What encouragement can we find in what happens after the seventh angel blows his trumpet?

Teaching Passage: Revelation 10-11

Then I saw another mighty angel coming down from heaven, wrapped in a cloud, with a rainbow over his head, and his face was like the sun, and his legs like pillars of fire. ² He had a little scroll open in his hand. And he set his right foot on the sea, and his left foot on the land, ³ and called out with a loud voice, like a lion roaring. When he called out, the seven thunders sounded. ⁴ And when the seven thunders had sounded, I was about to write, but I heard a voice from heaven saying, "Seal up what the seven thunders have said, and do not write it down." ⁵ And the angel whom I saw standing on the sea and on the land raised his right hand to heaven ⁶ and swore by him who lives forever and ever, who created heaven and what is in it, the earth and what is in it, and the sea and what is in it, that there would be no more delay, ⁷ but that in the days of the trumpet call to be sounded by the seventh angel, the mystery of God would be fulfilled, just as he announced to his servants the prophets.

⁸ Then the voice that I had heard from heaven spoke to me again, saying, "Go, take the scroll that is open in the hand of the angel who is standing on the sea and on the land." ⁹ So I went to the angel and told him to give me the little scroll. And he said to me, "Take and eat it; it will make your stomach bitter, but in your mouth it will be sweet as honey." ¹⁰ And I took the little scroll from the hand of the angel and ate it. It was sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I had eaten it my stomach was made bitter. ¹¹ And I was told, "You must again prophesy about many peoples and nations and languages and kings."

11 Then I was given a measuring rod like a staff, and I was told, "Rise and measure the temple of God and the altar and those who worship there, ² but do not measure the court outside the temple; leave that out, for it is given over to the nations, and they will trample the holy city for forty-two months. ³ And I will grant authority to my two witnesses, and they will prophesy for 1,260 days, clothed in sackcloth."

⁴ These are the two olive trees and the two lampstands that stand before the Lord of the earth. ⁵ And if anyone would harm them, fire pours from their mouth and consumes their foes. If anyone would harm them, this is how he is doomed to be killed. ⁶ They have the power to shut the sky, that no rain may fall during the days of their prophesying, and they have power over the waters to turn them into blood and to strike the earth with every kind of plaque, as often as they desire. ⁷ And when they have finished their testimony, the beast that rises from the bottomless pit will make war on them and conquer them and kill them, 8 and their dead bodies will lie in the street of the great city that symbolically is called Sodom and Egypt, where their Lord was crucified. ⁹ For three and a half days some from the peoples and tribes and languages and nations will gaze at their dead bodies and refuse to let them be placed in a tomb, ¹⁰ and those who dwell on the earth will rejoice over them and make merry and exchange presents, because these two prophets had been a torment to those who dwell on the earth. ¹¹ But after the three and a half days a breath of life from God entered them, and they stood up on their feet, and great fear fell on those who saw them. ¹² Then they heard a loud voice from heaven saying to them, "Come up here!" And they went up to heaven in a cloud, and their enemies watched them. ¹³ And at that hour there was a great earthquake, and a tenth of the city fell. Seven thousand people were killed in the earthquake, and the rest were terrified and gave glory to the God of heaven.

¹⁴ The second woe has passed; behold, the third woe is soon to come.

¹⁵ Then the seventh angel blew his trumpet, and there were loud voices in heaven, saying, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ, and he shall reign forever and ever." ¹⁶ And the twenty-four elders who sit on their thrones before God fell on their faces and worshiped God, ¹⁷ saying,

"We give thanks to you, Lord God Almighty, who is and who was, for you have taken your great power and begun to reign.
The nations raged, but your wrath came, and the time for the dead to be judged, and for rewarding your servants, the prophets and saints, and those who fear your name, both small and great, and for destroying the destroyers of the earth."

¹⁹ Then God's temple in heaven was opened, and the ark of his covenant was seen within his temple. There were flashes of lightning, rumblings, peals of thunder, an earthquake, and heavy hail.

For young children:

In chapter 10 John is instructed to eat the little scroll. Why do you think it was sweet as honey in the mouth but bitter in the stomach? Have you ever eaten something that tasted delicious but later gave you a tummy ache? How do you think the wrath of God could be like sweet and bitter?

John was instructed to measure the temple but leave out the outer courts. Talk about various ways to measure things.

Ask: What do we use to measure weight, like the weight of a package or the weight of yourself? What are forms of measurement of weight?

Ask: What can we use to measure length or height? What would you use to measure the length of a candy bar? What would you use the measure the height of yourself?

Ask: What can we use to measure time? What would you use to determine if it is time for bed? What would you use to measure how long it takes to do 20 jumping jacks?

Say: God is eternal, he has no beginning or end. God has an eternal kingdom, and he wants us to be part of it. What form of measurement do you think God created for us on earth, but is not necessary for Him in Heaven?

Ask: What was the response of the elders to the blow of the 7th trumpet announcing, "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ, and he shall reign forever and ever." (verse 16-18)? Listen to this week's worship songs while drawing a picture inspired by verses 11:16-19.
