TEACHING PASSAGE: Psalm 19

Discussion Questions:

1. This Psalm breaks into three sections. The first section is in verses 1-6. Who is this Psalm written by, and how is God revealed? (verse 1)
2. How far does the message from the heavens about the glory of God reach? (verse 4)
3. The second section is in verses 7-11 and shows how the Mosaic law reveals God using human words. What are some characteristics and effects of God's revelation? (verses 7-9)
4. Why is David so thankful for God's law? (verse 11) (Proverbs 29:18, Romans 7:12)
5. The last section in verses 12-14 is a humble response to all known about God. What are some ways to respond?

Teaching Passage: Psalm 19

- 1 The heavens declare the glory of God,
and the sky above proclaims his handiwork.
- 2 Day to day pours out speech,
and night to night reveals knowledge.
- 3 There is no speech, nor are there words,
whose voice is not heard.
- 4 Their voice goes out through all the earth,
and their words to the end of the world.
In them he has set a tent for the sun,
5 which comes out like a bridegroom leaving his chamber,
and, like a strong man, runs its course with joy.
- 6 Its rising is from the end of the heavens,
and its circuit to the end of them,
and there is nothing hidden from its heat.

- 7 The law of the Lord is perfect,
reviving the soul;
the testimony of the Lord is sure,
making wise the simple;
- 8 the precepts of the Lord are right,
rejoicing the heart;
the commandment of the Lord is pure,
enlightening the eyes;
- 9 the fear of the Lord is clean,
enduring forever;
the rules of the Lord are true,
and righteous altogether.
- 10 More to be desired are they than gold,
even much fine gold;
sweeter also than honey
and drippings of the honeycomb.
- 11 Moreover, by them is your servant warned;
in keeping them there is great reward.

- 12 Who can discern his errors?
Declare me innocent from hidden faults.
- 13 Keep back your servant also from presumptuous sins;
let them not have dominion over me!
Then I shall be blameless,
and innocent of great transgression.

For Children:

Ask: What do the heavens declare? Why do you think the writer writes about nature before writing about God's law?

Do: If it is sunny out right now, go outside and notice how the heat of the sun feels on your face. Find some shade, notice how the light of the sun still lights up the space in the shade. If you have time, watch the sun set tonight and if you can wake up early, watch the sunrise in tomorrow.

Ask: How is the law of the Lord described in the second stanza? Can you think of anything else in your life that is absolutely perfect, no flaw at all? What are some benefits of God's law mentioned in this Psalm?

Talk about it: Let's pretend someone gave you a new toy that is very complicated to build but is very fun when it is built correctly. But if it is not built correctly, it won't work the way it is designed to work and it will fail to be fun. Would you rather build it according to the instructions written by the inventor of the toy or would you toss the instructions aside and try building it on your own?

Ask: Who created the world? Who created you and me?

Say: We are all faced with the temptation to sin.

Ask: Who does the writer rely on to help him resist temptation.

Sing: The last verse says, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer. Sing this hymn together.
